# DRAFT DESIGN CONCEPT FOR THE TORPEDO FACTORY – CONSULTATION SUMMARY

#### Introduction

A Draft Design Concept for the Torpedo Factory at Sub Base Platypus was publicly exhibited from 12 February to 12 April 2019. This summary provides an outline of issues raised and how these were addressed in the Harbour Trust's consideration of the matter.

### **Background**

The Harbour Trust has developed a <u>design concept</u> for the Torpedo Factory at Sub Base Platypus, to provide more detail about how the <u>Management Plan</u>'s vision for the building would be realised.

In broad terms, the concept involves removing the sides of the building's upper level and some roof sheeting, and introducing landscaping, to create a partly-covered area of public open space. Parking for site visitors would be provided at the High Street end. In keeping with the Management Plan, this space could be used for recreation, with the possibility of a pop-up café, and occasional community activities. The lower level, at the harbour end, would be adapted for commercial uses in accordance with the approved Management Plan.

Retaining the steel framework of the upper level will enable the creation of covered public space while interpreting the site's heritage values. This would provide a unique space with a high level of amenity, offering shelter from sun and rain, while opening up elevated views across the harbour. Landscaping would soften this space, and help to screen parking and protect privacy for residences to the south. Adapting the upper level in this way will radically reduce the building's bulk when viewed from all angles, be it from the harbour, street, or nearby residential areas.

#### **Public Exhibition**

### **Notification**

The Draft Design Concept was exhibited from 12 February to 12 April 2019. The Draft Design Concept document was available for viewing at the Harbour Trust's Mosman office, North Sydney Council chambers, Stanton Library and on the Harbour Trust website.

The public was invited to comment on the design concept through a range of channels, including:

- Notices in The Mosman Daily (14 February 2019) and Daily Telegraph (5 April 2019)
- 250 Direct emails/letters to interested stakeholders and Community Advisory Committee (CAC) members.
- 6,000 Newsletters hand-delivered to local residences and businesses
- Over 3,300 e-newsletters emailed to interested community members

#### Harbour Trust's Community Advisory Committee (CAC)

The Draft Design Concept was discussed at the **Community Advisory Committee** (CAC) meetings on 6 February 2019 and 5 June 2019.

## **Drop-in Sessions**

The Harbour Trust held two on-site 'Drop-in Sessions', on 28 February 2019 (between 4pm - 7pm) and 2 March 2019 (between 10am – 2pm) to provide the community with an opportunity to discuss the Draft Design Concept with Harbour Trust's Planners. Over 100 people attended.

#### **Submissions Received**

The Harbour Trust received submissions from 81 stakeholders (four submitters made two submissions each). Submissions raised a number of issues ranging from those in support of the design concept, through to those wishing to see the entire building demolished. A summary of issues raised is provided further below.

#### **Petitions**

**Four petitions containing a total of 528 names** were also received. The petitions broadly called for Sub Base Platypus to be made into a park with open spaces and recreational activities, and for the Torpedo Factory to be demolished. The issues raised by the petitions are considered in the summary below.

### Harbour Trust Board consideration of the matter

The Harbour Trust has carefully considered the community's feedback, which has helped us to better understand the range of issues, and ways in which the Torpedo Factory design could be further improved.

At its meeting on 22 July 2019, the Harbour Trust Board considered feedback received from the community and the CAC regarding the Torpedo Factory concept. The Board discussed the concept and agreed it was important to retain the built form, given both the history of the site and the opportunity to create amenity within the built form. In view of these significant considerations, demolition of the Torpedo Factory is not supported by the Board.

The Board supports the concept of adapting the building as a park, with the building's structure revealed, together with some public parking and commercial/community opportunities. The Board noted that the concept will be refined and will be consistent with the heritage of the site and the environmental values of the Harbour Trust. The Board emphasised the need to ensure the works provided value to the local and broader community and should seek to address matters raised in the consultation process.

#### Next Steps

The Commonwealth Government recently announced an additional \$11.4 million in funding for the Harbour Trust towards the Sub Base Platypus Renewal Project. The Board noted that the budget of \$11.4m may present challenges.

The Harbour Trust will now work on refining the design, and will consult further with the community once an updated scheme has been prepared.
